The First Amendment provides: Congress shall make no law . . . abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press. Although the First Amendment, in general, protects pornography, the Supreme Court has held that it does not protect two types of pornography: obscenity and child pornography. Consequently, the government may, and has, banned them. Child pornography is material that visually depicts sexual conduct by children. It is unprotected by the First Amendment even when it is not legally obscene; in addition, the Supreme Court has held that, although the Constitution protects the right to possess obscene material in one s own home (even though it is otherwise unprotected), the Constitution does not protect the right to possess child pornography in one s own home. Federal statutes, in addition to making it a crime to transport or receive child pornography in interstate or foreign commerce, prohibit, among other things, the use of a minor in producing pornography, and provide for criminal and civil forfeiture of real and personal property used in making child pornography, and of the profits...
